

Creating a Great Neighborhood: Allied Drive Community Design Process

Mission Statement: Conduct a community design meeting to assist the residents and other stakeholders of the Allied Drive neighborhood visualize the rehabilitation of their community based on neighborhood input that will enable them to identify steps for economic revitalization and development of a mix of housing options to meet residents' needs.

Schedule of Activities

- Sept. 7:** Neighborhood residents provide input to architects and consultants on major themes of housing, economic development, transportation, security, quality of life and community character.
- Sept. 8:** Based on neighborhood input, alternate solutions are developed by focus groups of architects, who report out to neighborhood residents and other key stakeholders and to the Allied Drive Task Force representatives throughout the day.
- Sept. 9:** The teams of architects continue to meet to refine alternative solutions and report out to group.
- Sept. 10:** The architects meet as a whole to integrate the focus groups' solutions into a single vision – based on all neighborhood resident and key stakeholder input over the previous three days – and create presentation documents and report the outcome of the process to the entire group in a celebration at the end of the day.
- Post-event:** The architects refine the presentations and prepare a written report to the community.

Coordinated by **AIA Southwest Wisconsin**, a Chapter of The American Institute of Architects, architects and allied professionals will assist Allied Drive residents in discovering a new vision for the neighborhood to move forward, not out. Working with the community, these AIA members are volunteering their time, talent and expertise to the visioning process. In honor of the 150th anniversary of The American Institute of Architects, members nationwide are empowering citizens to share in creating a vision for their communities. For 150 years, architects have used the design processes to help citizens find their voices and realize a vision for beautiful, safe and livable communities. www.aia150.org; www.aia.org
